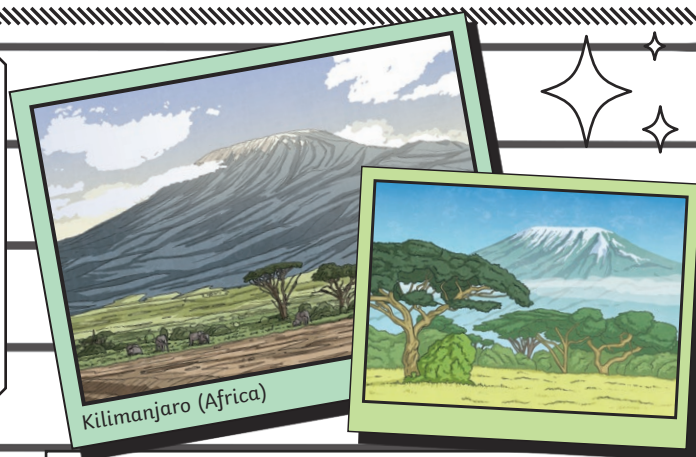


The World's Tallest Mountains

There has been much discussion by experts over which mountains should be named the tallest in the world. The **Seven Summits** is a list of the tallest mountains on each of the world's seven continents. In the Seven Summits Challenge, explorers strive to climb all of these mountains.



Kilimanjaro (Africa)

Kilimanjaro is a type of mountain called a **stratovolcano**. There are three volcanic cones called Kibo, Shira and Mawenzi. The highest is Kibo at 5895 metres. The climb up this mountain is considered to be an easy one for hikers.

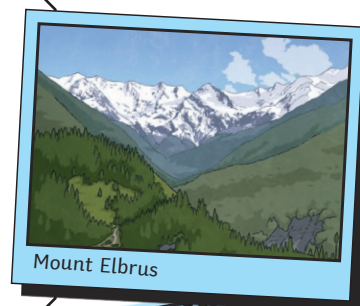
Did You Know...?

Altitude sickness can be caused by a lack of oxygen high up on a mountain, which can make people unwell.

Mount Elbrus (Europe)

This mountain is part of a **range** called the Caucasus and can be found in Russia. It gets its name from its twisted shape and it is believed by various experts that ancient people called it 'Strobilus'. Akhia Sottaiev was the first person to reach the summit in 1874.

A cable car on the mountain helps to take climbers most of the way so this is thought to be an easy climb for many.



Denali (North America)

This mountain is the third-highest mountain in the world and can be found in North America as part of the Alaskan Range, measuring around 6194 metres. Its name comes from the Koyukon, Athabascan language and means 'The Tall One' or 'The High One'. Walter Harper was the first climber to reach the top of Denali on 7th June 1913. This climb is regarded as difficult because of poor weather conditions in the region and its sharp incline.

The World's Tallest Mountains

Mount Everest (Asia)

Mount Everest is the highest mountain in the world with a height of 8850 metres. It is also known as 'Chomolungma', meaning 'Goddess Mother of the World'. An explorer called Edmund Hillary and his **Sherpa**, Tenzing Norgay, were the first to climb this mountain range in the Himalayas. However, high altitude and expensive equipment make this a difficult mountain to attempt.



Mount Vinson (Antarctica)

Only around 1200 climbers have managed to reach the summit of Mount Vinson because it has extremely cold temperatures and a secluded location. This mountain has a height of 4829 metres and the peak was first reached by Nicholas Clinch in December 1966.



Aconcagua (South America)

The two summits of this mountain in the south and north are joined by a ridge that is around 6962 metres high. It is believed to be a strenuous climb because of unpredictable storms and high altitude.



Carstensz Pyramid (Oceania)

At 4884 metres, Carstensz Pyramid or Puncak Jaya is a snow-topped mountain found in Oceania. It is part of the Sudirman Range.

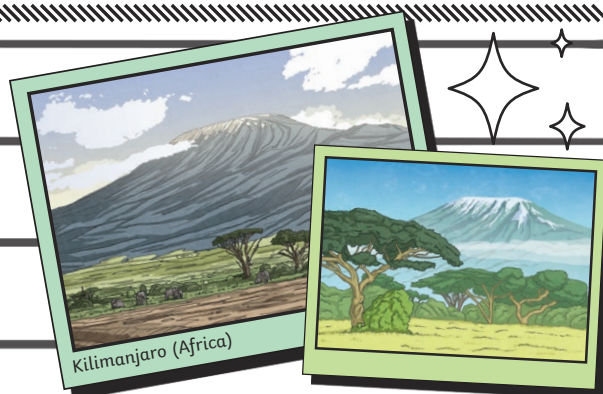

The World's Tallest Mountains

There has been much discussion by experts over which mountains should be classified as the tallest mountains in the world. As a result of their height, the Seven **Summits** — one from each continent — have been identified as the victors. Every year, explorers from all over the globe try to climb these peaks in a feat that is widely known as the Seven Summits Challenge.



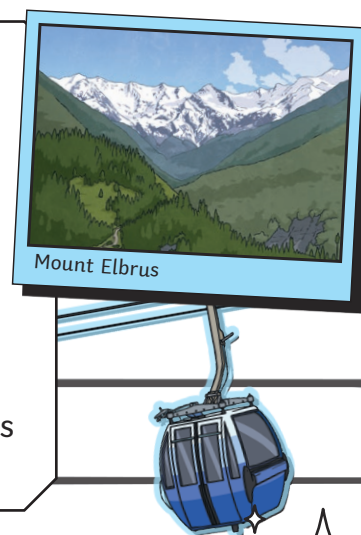
Kilimanjaro (Africa)

Kilimanjaro is a type of mountain known as a **stratovolcano**. This mountain comprises of three volcanic cones; Shira and Mawenzi are extinct while Kibo (the tallest of the three at 5895 metres) is a dormant volcano. Many tourists and climbers visit Kilimanjaro due to its reputation of being easier to climb than most other known summits. Little experience and climbing gear are needed; however, it is not uncommon for climbers to have problems with **altitude sickness** caused by low oxygen levels.

Mount Elbrus (Europe)

This mountain can be found in south-western Russia and is part of the Caucasus **Range**. It is believed by many that ancient people named this mountain 'Strobilus' after its twisted, cone-like shape. The first explorer to make it to the summit (5642 metres) was Akhia Sottaiev in 1874.

Popular with tourists, this climb has a convenient cable car that takes trekkers up to around 3658 metres, leaving less of the mountain to scale. As a result of the snowy climate, this location is also popular with skiers and hikers.



Denali (North America)

Denali stands at 6194 metres. It is found in North America in the Alaskan Range. Formerly known as Mount McKinley, the name Denali originates from the Koyukon, Athabascan word meaning 'The Tall One' or 'The High One'. On 7th June 1913, Walter Harper made history by being the first explorer to climb the summit of Denali.



The World's Tallest Mountains

Mount Everest (Asia)

With a height of 8850 metres, Mount Everest is widely known as the tallest mountain in the Seven Summits and is indeed the highest point on Earth. Locals refer to this mountain as 'Chomolungma' – meaning 'Goddess Mother of the world'. This Himalayan mountain was first scaled in 1953 by explorer Edmund Hillary and his **Sherpa** called Tenzing Norgay. As well as low oxygen levels, the high cost of crucial equipment means this climb is only for the most experienced and those who can afford it.



Mount Vinson (Antarctica)

Few climbers have made the climb up Mount Vinson (around 1200) due to its freezing temperatures and remote location in Antarctica. Its name comes from an American congressman who admired the exploration of Antarctica. Part of the Sentinel Range, this mountain rises 4829 metres above sea level and was first scaled by Nicholas Clinch in December 1966.



Aconcagua (South America)

Located in Argentina, this mountain has two summits in the northern and southern regions that are connected by a ridge. This mountain is around 6962 metres high. It is believed to be a challenging climb because of its frequent storms and high altitude.



Carstensz Pyramid (Oceania)

Carstensz Pyramid or Puncak Jaya, in the Sudirman Range, is a snow-topped mountain and stands at 4884 metres.

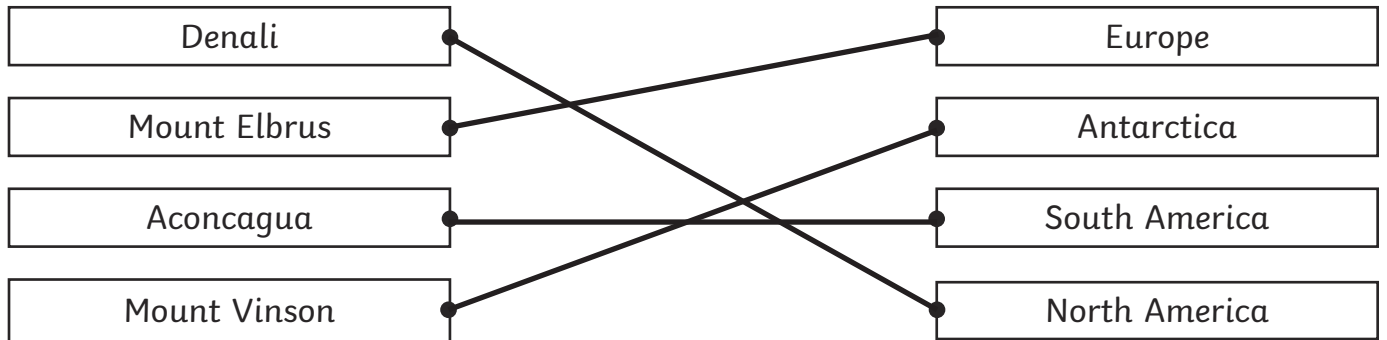

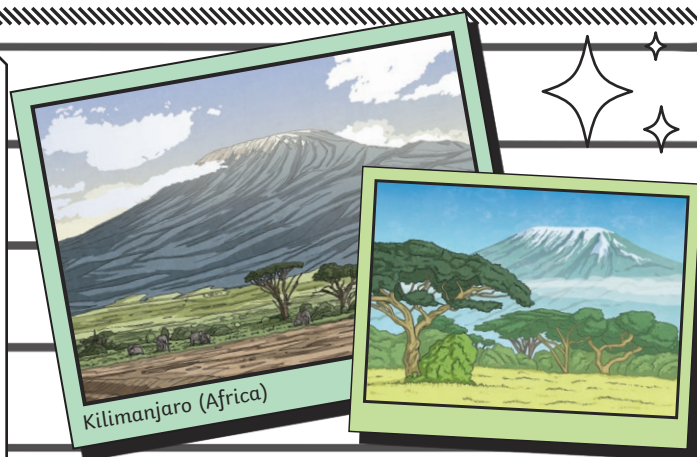

The World's Tallest Mountains

There has been much debate as to which mountains in the world should be known as the tallest. Several of these mountains have been listed in a unique group called the Seven Summits. Each one is located on a different continent of the world and added to the list based on their elevation. Many explorers strive to ascend these mountains, embarking on a venture known as the Seven Summits Challenge.



Kilimanjaro (Africa)

Kilimanjaro is considered by many to be the largest free-standing mountain in the world. It comprises of three cone-like volcanic formations called Shira, Mawenzi and Kibo, making this a stratovolcano (a volcano with a steep, cone shape, consisting of hardened layers of ash, lava and rock).

While Shira and Mawenzi are extinct volcanoes, Kibo is dormant and is the highest peak of the cones, with a summit (the highest point of something, especially the top of a mountain) of 5895 metres.

Considered to be a relatively easy climb, Kilimanjaro is a popular choice for climbers of all abilities as little experience and equipment is needed to ascend; the only real problem is altitude sickness (an illness caused by a lack of oxygen because of being high above sea level).

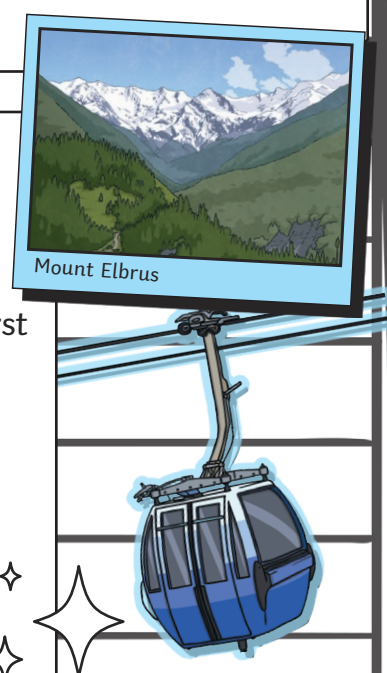
Mount Elbrus (Europe)

Located in south-western Russia, Mount Elbrus is part of the Caucasus Range (a line or group of mountains or hills).

Formed over 2.5 million years ago, ancient people named this mountain 'Strobilus' because of its twisted, pinecone shape. The first explorer to ascend the peak of 5642 metres was Akhia Sottaiev (a Balkarian guide), who led a team of British and Swiss climbers.

This mountain, although high, has the advantage of a cable car which takes climbers to an altitude of around 3658 metres.

As a result of glacial temperatures, this mountain is also popular as a hiking and skiing destination.



The World's Tallest Mountains

Denali (North America)

Denali is located in the Alaskan Range. This mountain measures 6194 metres and its name is derived from the Koyukon, Athabascan word - 'The Tall One' or 'The High One'. The first person to conquer this mountain was Koyukon Athabascan, Walter Harper, who reached the summit on 7th June 1913. Amongst the problems facing experienced climbers are: severe weather and sharp vertical climbs.

Mount Everest (Asia)

Mount Everest is probably the most famous mountain of the Seven Summits. Its height is 8850 metres, allowing it to be recognised by many as the highest point on Earth. It is part of the Himalayan mountain range and locals refer to it by its Tibetan name, 'Chomolungma', meaning 'Goddess Mother of the World'.

Although there were many attempts to scale the peak in the 1920s, it was only officially conquered in 1953 by an explorer called Edmund Hillary and his Tibetan Sherpa called Tenzing Norgay. Tenzing was part of a group of local guides known as Sherpas (a member of the Himalayan people who often guide climbers up the mountains).

When climbing Mount Everest, there are many problems that climbers have to face, such as a limited climbing season, low altitude and expensive equipment; resulting in only well-prepared teams making the journey.

Mount Vinson (Antarctica)

It is believed that bitter temperatures and its remote location make this a difficult mountain to climb; recent studies show that only about 1200 climbers have attempted it. The name Vinson originates from an American congressman who championed explorers of Antarctica. At an elevation of 4829 metres, this mountain is part of the Sentinel Range and was one of the most recent mountains to be scaled. A group of American explorers, headed by Nicholas Clinch, achieved this glory when they ascended the summit in December 1966.

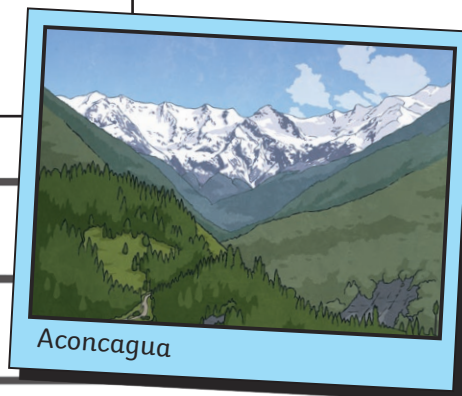

The World's Tallest Mountains

Aconcagua (South America)

Being part of the Andes mountain chain, Aconcagua can be found in Argentina and comprises a connected northern and southern ridge. This impressive mountain, with volcanic origins, is second in height to Mount Everest. Standing at around 6962 metres, it has the potential for high winds and frequent storms and its high altitude can make any attempt to climb it a problematic one.



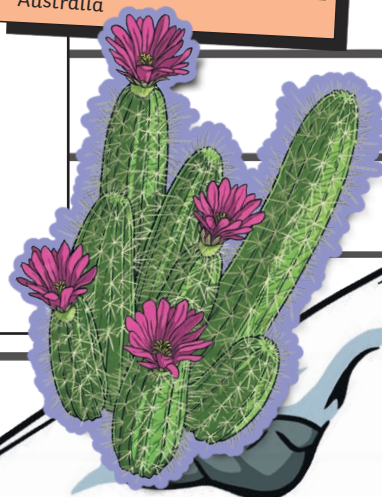
Mount Kosciuszko (Australia)

Carstenz Pyramid (Oceania)

These two mountains are both climbed as some experts are unsure over which land mass makes up the continent of Oceania.

Mount Kosciuszko is an Australian mountain found in New South Wales, reaching a peak of 2228 metres. It was first climbed by Paul Strzelecki in 1840.

Experts believe that Carstenz Pyramid or Puncak Jaya (in the Sudirman Range) is one of the most difficult mountains to attempt due to its challenging terrain and its peak standing at 4884 metres.

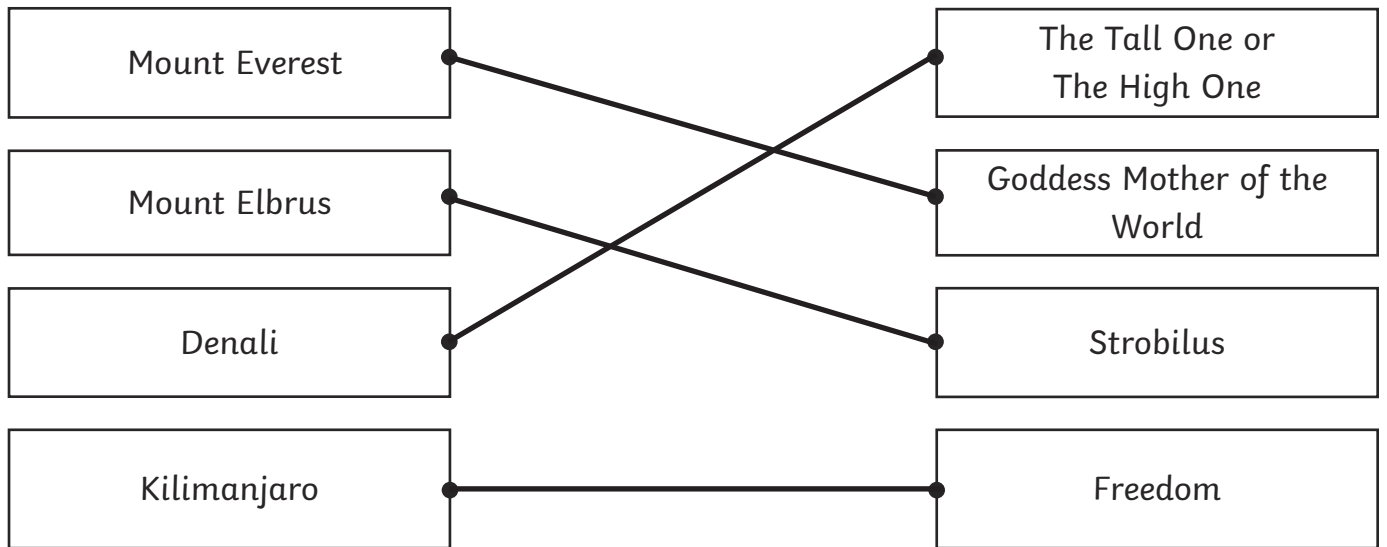
